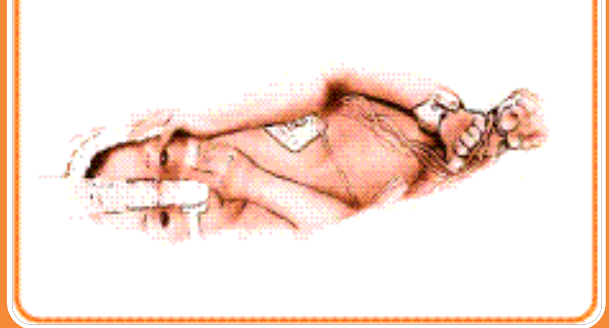

Location & Venue

London, UK

Venue
